OUR COMPUTERS GET A 'RAVE REVIEW'

Did you see what the national financial daily paper FINANCIAL REVIEW said last month about our computer set-up?

The State Savings Bank of Victoria may well have the most cost-effective computer system of any government or private enterprise bank in the country.

'The Bank has planned an installed netork of 864 online electro-mechanical terminals throughout the Melbourne area, controlled by two medium-sized central

processing units by the end of the year.

Emphasis is very much on maximum utilisation of existing equipment from IBM, ICL and Olivetti — and no definite replacement strategy is scheduled before 1981.

'Not bad at all for a Victorian Government-owned institution whose operations end at the Victorian border. Of the far bigger national banks, none of the private industry operations has yet an online branch network even approaching that of the SSB.'



U.S.A.: Economy heading for a slump

The American economy will steam through 1976 with 'all systems go' and straight into a recession in 1977 that will be even more severe than the recent downturn, according to Michael Evans, president of Chase Econometrics. This forecaster, who has had a better record than most in predicting the renewal of double-digit inflation, said he believed that the slump would be worldwide. He saw a slowdown in real output, more inflation, and sporadic community shortages on a global scale beginning in 1977, after a short recovery led by the United States and Japan.

ITALY: Photo-Identity credit cards

A recent innovation by the Banca Commerciale Italiana is the use of plastic-backed integrated photographs on credit cards. The standard card can be embossed with information and can be fitted with a magnetic tape for identification. Its advantage over similar cards is that a color photograph is also incorporated in the card, showing the owner's face, signature and any information considered useful by the Bank. A photographic mark either a name or a symbol — is stamped over the face and printed text. The whole photograph is covered by a

and printed text. The whole photograph is covered by a thin, transparent plastic skin which cannot be removed without damaging the card and making it useless. (An estimated 400 American banks are also using the integrated color photograph for credit cards and they are reported to be completely satisfied. In fact, their market share has increased significantly since adopting this system. A survey of clients has revealed that one of this system. A survey of clients has revealed that one of the most attractive features of this new system is the extra security provided.).

U.S.A.: A bank for wome

Women's liberation has not baulked at banking. In New York city The First Women's Bank has opened its doors. A further seven women's banks are planned. The aim of these banks, according to a spokesman for them, is to provide women with assistance in all forms of credit operations, and give them appropriate advice. Some of these women's banks intend to take on the business of young women and divorcees. Others offer courses in money management. Their business is not entirely limited to women.



Must close now. I'm off to town to change the scarf I


bought yesterday - it's too tight for me.


'Tellers have to quickly assess the needs of individual customers, and deliver the goods," says Kevin. "In my opinion, politeness and efficiency are the main qualities

STATE BANKCARD SOON TO BE STATE-WIDF

(and 'national' by Christmas)

BANKCARD will be operating Victoria-wide by the end of July. The scheme extended last month through the region bounded by Bendigo, Ararat, Swan Hill and Echuca. This month BANKCARD moves into the Goulburn Valley from Shepparton to Benalla and Myrtleford. In June and July it will go to Colac, Camperdown, Warrnambool, Hamilton, Horsham, Mildura, Wangaratta and Wodonga, thus completing coverage of the State.

More than 12,500 Victorian shops and services are now accepting BANKCARD - which is being used at the rate of more than a million

transactions monthly.

By the end of this year, BANK-CARD will be operating as a national scheme. This will enable State BANKCARD holders, travelling anywhere in Australia, to draw emergency cash from any branch of any bank — without having to pre-arrange lodgement of their signatures at particular branches. Also, of course, it will mean that card holders will be able to make BANKCARD purchases right around the continent.





aged from three to seven years.












In top State 16...
