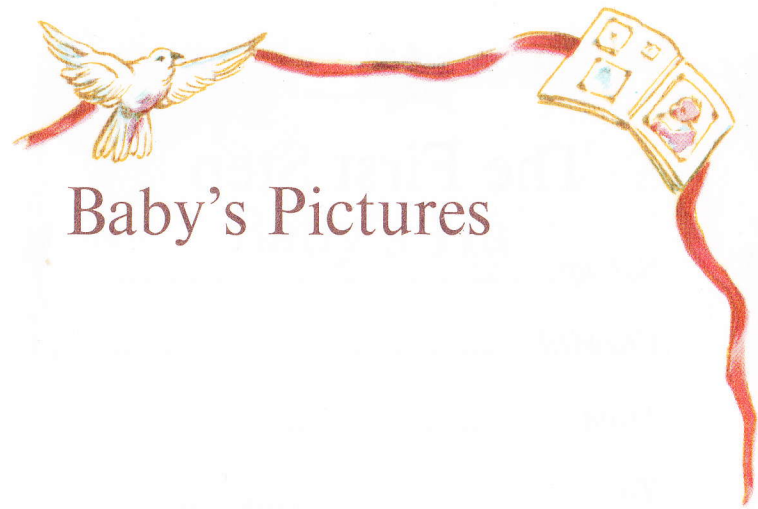

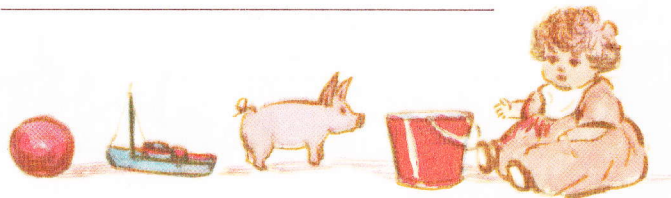

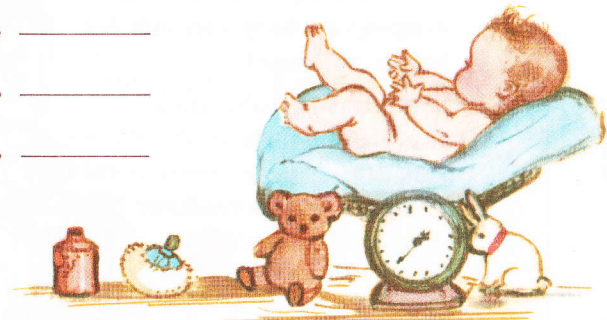

Home Safety

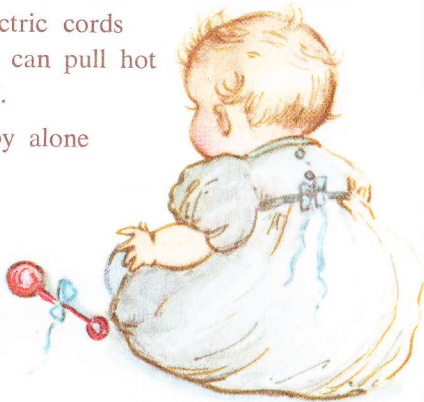
Loving Your Baby is Keeping Him Safe.

Safety is . . .

- Never leaving your baby unattended.
- Always turning saucepan handles away from the edge of the stove.
- Always running cold water into the bath first.
- Always having a guard around your heating appliances.
- Always keeping scissors, knives and tools out of sight.
- Always wiping up spilt liquids.

Safety is . . .

- Never leaving electric cords dangling so baby can pull hot liquids on himself.
- Never leaving baby alone in a room with a lighted gas heater or stove.



Safety is . . .

- Always picking up broken glass, pins and needles off the floor.
- Always keeping doors and gates tightly shut so that baby can't crawl through and get out on the road.
- Always locking up medicines and cleaning materials in a locked cupboard out of reach, not just keeping them out of sight in a drawer.
- Always keeping matches and cigarette lighters out of baby's reach.
