



Our Bank is implementing a new system for integrated staff training. A sub-committee comprising Peter Molloy, Garry Doyle and Michael de Josselin has been formed to start the system.

An eight-member committee, responsible to chief executive Bill Moyle, was formed in October as the forerunner to the sub-committee.

The new concept is known as Structured Training Education Path.

Each level of the STEP program includes combinations of training methods and systems including the use of the staff training centres supported by programmed learning exercises to be completed in-branch.

The first area to be looked at in STEP is the new 13-week induction program starting on January 8.

Under the system, branches and departments will be able to request training material. Updated lists of the program will be regularly published for staff.

The 13-week program will involve four training centre courses and 53 exercises to be completed in-branch.

The exercises will take no more than 20 minutes to complete and provide a means of self-learning that may be completed at any time of the day.

Affirmative

The first steps towards an affirmative action program for women have been taken.

An inaugural meeting of a consultative committee to study current personnel practices and the role of women in the Bank was held on December 11.

The meeting was chaired by John Williams, chief manager personnel, with consultant, Mary Wilson, and Helen O'Donoghue, affirmative action officer.

State Bank SuperSafe Approved Deposit Fund has become the first

approved deposit fund in Australia to exceed \$100 million in balances.

This was achieved against competition from more than 30 approved deposit funds and more than 34 deferred annuity funds, including funds offered by the major banks, life insurance companies and merchant banks, competing for lump sum termination payments.

Our Chief Executive Bill Moyle says: "The figure has been achieved in just over 12 months and the fund is continuing to grow strongly.

"State Bank SuperSafe represents about 25 per cent of the amount invested in approved deposit funds and about 18 per cent of the combined amount invested in approved deposit funds and deferred annuities.'

It will be followed by a week of celebrations for the centenary of the Australian Institute of Bankers.


For the third time, the AIB has been given the honor of running an IBSS.

The IBSS principal will be AIB executive director Robert Barnes and the director of studies will be National Australia Bank chief economist, Brian Hamley.

Each Australian bank will be represented at the school.






Journey

The Tigers won three games in D-grade in the Victorian Amateur Football Association in season 85. Their last premiership was in E-grade in 1972 and Ken says it is time for the Tigers to move up and win more flags.

The club was admitted to the Metropolitan Amateur Association, the forerunner to the VAFA, in 1927 and won the C-grade premiership that year.

The Tigers won the reserves premiership in D-grade in 1977.

Netballers in Grand Final


State Bank netball team will play in the grand final of the Melbourne City Council corporate challenge against Scottish Amicable in the City Square in February.
