### Crime Stoppers!

State Bank Victoria has given \$10,000 to a new police crime-busting programme, Crime Stoppers, which starts soon.

We are the first bank to contribute to Crime Stoppers, a community-based programme which will offer rewards for information about crimes.

The \$10,000 cheque was presented to crime commissioner, Vaughan Werner, by John Williams, head of personnel. Police plan to raise at least \$100,000 from cor-

Crime Stoppers has been introduced to Australia by Victoria Police media director Geoff Wilkinson who studied the North American and British programmes on a Churchill Fellowship. New York's Crime Stoppers solves one violent crime every second day and a murder or attempted murder every week.

Crime Stoppers programmes in North America have been responsible for solving more than 146,800 crimes and the recovery of stolen property and narcotics valued at more than \$US807 million. A monthly BBC programme, Crimewatch UK, regularly attracts an audience of up to 15 million. is a major initiative in the fight against crime.

"For too long, crime has been regarded as a police problem in isolation, but the State's crime

"There were more than 283,000 major crimes in-Victoria last year," says **Ross Barnett**, marketing department's sponsorship manager.

"Some of those were committed against banks, so it is a natural sponsorship for our Bank to back police and the community in this way."








### The magic of steam on show at Mornington

### Former manager opens ramp for disabled at Stratford branch



"Calls are improvised with the idea of geiting you back with your original partner at the end of the dance. Occasionally, it doesn't work and we all have a good laugh. Ron has been a caller for 25 years, and does a wonderful job of encouraging a cheerful atmosphere."

Debbie Layton, of premises department, is another nimble State Banker who has been square dancing in Box Hill since early last year.

"I had done a lot of ballroom dancing in the past, and wanted to do something a little less formal," says Debbie.

"Square dancing's lack of competition suits me perfectly. It's a lot of fun with many people dancing for hours. It's relaxing and energetic at the same time."

Debbie, who dances about twice a week, has layers of petticoats and a full circle skirt to wear to each session.


