

Fitzroy Centenary

Colonial Capers!

We staged 'The 1879 Show' at Fitzroy on March 6, to celebrate the centenary of our Smith Street branch.

Billowing banners fluttered from the Victorian-era building amid signs proclaiming '100 Years of Service'. The banking chamber became a display area, with an array of historic photographs, banking and sporting mementoes. The staff worked in colonial costumes, and migrant officers paraded in ethnic dress while a girl folk-singer 'busked' outside the branch. 'Open Day' was declared, and hundreds of customers and visitors arrived to inspect the displays and collect souvenir showbags. Old depositors were given a morning tea party by manager Eric Andrews.

On radio 3UZ, top-rating personality Bert Newton devoted a full hour from 10.00 a.m. to 'Fitzroy Memories', and conducted several interviews with old identities, including former Fitzroy

branch staffer Bill Thompson.

At 4.00 p.m., Fitzroy Mayor Les Sotiriadis, in full regalia, and our Acting General Manager Murray Souter arrived by the State Bank/GTV9 helicopter at the Smith Reserve — to christen, with steaks and sausages, a large electric barbecue donated by the Bank as a centenary gesture. Head office girls in period dress added glamour to the scene.

Later, more than 150 local citizens, including the Mayor and Councillors and local M.L.C. member Mr Doug Elliot (remembered as 'Uncle Doug' of our Mickey Mouse Club days)

attended a function at the branch.

Manager Andrews made a presentation to the oldest branch depositor, then Mr Souter announced a \$100,000 loan to Fitzroy, almost half of which would expand the city library's book and tool lending facilities.

Points made by Mr Souter in his speech:

"The opening of our first suburban branch was a very significant event for the Bank and for Victoria. It established the principle of branches under central control rather than the local control in use until that time.

"In 1879 more than 70% of Victoria's population of 900,000 lived in the country, where 10 of the 11 local savings banks had been established. Fitzroy was the first recognition by the Bank of the growing industrialisation of Melbourne.

"Fitzroy was where Victoria's industrialisation began, and we were part of that beginning.



"Today, a century later, we are still proud to be part of the Fitzroy community. Tangible evidence of that is the special loan of \$100,000 to the City of Fitzroy, and the granting by the Commissioners of a barbecue which we hope will be the focal point of a new local community recreation area. "Victoria's cultural life has benefited immensely from the influx of

"Victoria's cultural life has benefited immensely from the influx of migrants. The City of Fitzroy has been one of the major beneficiaries. Many migrants work with us in the Bank and bank with us, and we are very proud of them."

Mayor Sotiriadis responded:

"Your Bank has helped a generation of Fitzroy people to buy homes in this city, and has provided advice and guidance which have been of immense value.

"The State Bank barbecue will be a great community asset, and will be a lasting reminder of a century of service to Ftizroy."

It's A Beaut Life At Baxter!

Our Staff College outside Frankston has acquired various nicknames during the past 18 months — among them 'BAXTER HILTON', 'COCHRANE COLLEGE', 'ROACH'S RANCH', 'McNAUGHT'S MANSIONS' and 'PRETTY'S PALACE' but it has consistently had only one reputation: 'EXCELLENT'. Praise has always been plentiful for the luxurious College, which combines the amenities of a holiday hotel with the privacy of a 21acre bush sanctuary setting.

More than 700 managers and accountants have 'graduated' since the College opened in August 1977, and current course members

range over all grades and classifications.

Thirty six officers attend each 3-week course, and each member is accommodated in a separate motel-type unit with an outside view of bushland. Most members go home for the weekends (from 4.45 p.m. Fridays, returning 8.30 a.m. Mondays) and all have Wednesday afternoons off for recreation of their own choosing. The choice is wide:

SWIMMING in the heated pool (especially popular in early morning and late afternoon) or at local beaches only a 5-minute drive away.

PLAYING TENNIS, Squash or Table Tennis in the College's fully-equipped games area.

JOGGING around the picturesque track lining the \(\frac{3}{2} \)-mile perimeter fence of the College grounds.


GOLFING on Wednesday afternoons at the exclusive, nearby 'Millionaire's Course' - Frankston Golf Club (or practising on the College's own Par-3 hole).

SOCIALISING in the spacious lounge and games rooms, with drinks if required (all course members receive \$4 daily expense money in addition to normal Bank salary). Playing POOL, SNOOKER, BILLIARDS . . . Singing around the pianola or piano. Reading in quiet corners.

WALKING on peaceful bush tracks through eucalypts, wattles and melaleucas inhabited by native birds, possums, and the

occasional wombat.

FAMILY BARBECUES: Usually on the second Sunday of each course, members are invited to take their families and friends to the College — for a look around and a barbecue lunch. Attendance is normally 80-plus.



Computer Operators

These days, some young State Bankers are choosing a new career direction. Instead of moving up through the branch structure from CLERICAL to CASH, they are progressing out of branches to COMPUTERS.

Currently, 27 operators are employed at our modern, airconditioned computer complex in Spencer Street, city. They work in four overlapping shifts around the clock, and receive pay loadings ranging from 12½% to 27½%, plus car mileage or taxi allowances for night travel.

Each person works the same shift for a fortnight at a time, and is rostered three months in advance.

The New Banking Breed

Recruited mainly from branch staffs, the computer aspirants must first pass an aptitude test, then undergo about three months of training on the job before becoming operators. Then they advance from simple work, like fitting tape reels, changing over discs, and separating printout sheets — to actually operating computer console keyboards.

Progressively they learn to 'run' as many as six different programs through the computer at once — under supervision of a senior operator.

The main work they perform — and it is absolutely vital to the running of the Bank — is the nightly processing of the hundreds of thousands of transactions logged daily by the 253 branches in our on-line network.

Since spending a year in Japan as a Rotary exchange student, Kerri Rymer has acquired an oriental outlook, and a wardrobe of kimonos.



A customer's lament: Experts speak of cash flow, I wish they would refrain. No matter what I do, my cash Flows mainly down the drain.


TIP for tellers from the musical comedy 'Annie': 'YOU'RE NEVER FULLY DRESS-ED WITHOUT A SMILE'.




D. I. JEFFREY, Beaufort.





Following this secondment, Lindsay resumed banking work and became involved as an organiser with the Croydon Community Service and the




Mickey Moneybox Sold For \$14!
